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1. Scope

1.1 INTRODUCTION — Species listed in this standard are grouped by Softwood, Hardwood, or Commercial Species

Group categories. The Commercial Species Group category is composed of different species or genera grouped for marketing convenience and identified with a single commercial name. Commercial names represent commercial practice in the United States and Canada.
