1 Scope

This part of ISO 3262 specifies requirements and corresponding methods of test for products made from naturally occurring talc in lamellar form associated with carbonates.

NOTE The mineralogical classes have been designated in accordance with products existing on the market (see annex A).

natural association of hydrated magnesium silicate $3MgO\cdot4SiO_2\cdot H_2O\mid Mg_3[(OH)_2/Si_4O_{10}]$ and carbonates, for example dolomite $CaMg(CO_3)_2$ and magnesite $MgCO_3$

4 Requirements and test methods

For natural talc in lamellar form, containing carbonates, complying with this part of ISO 3262, the essential requirements are specified in Table 1 and the conditional requirements are listed in Table 2.

5 Test report

The test report shall contain at least the following information:

- a) all details necessary to identify the product tested;
- b) a reference to this part of ISO 3262 (ISO 3262-11);
- c) the results of the tests and whether or not the product complies with the relevant specification limits;
- d) any deviation from the test methods specified;
- e) the dates of the tests.

These values do not take account of the effect on the result of any surface treatment.

Ternary diagram illustrating the mineralogical grades (A and B) of natural talc/chlorite, in lamellar form, containing carbonates


