Introduction

In order to implement the “Packaging and the environment” series of International Standards, all those involved in the packaging chain including economic operators, public and local authorities and consumers will be dealing with many terms related to packaging and in particular to used packaging.

Some of the definitions in that series of International Standards are self-supporting but some make reference to other standards.

In order to facilitate a good understanding of the International Standards in the field of packaging and the environment, this part of ISO 21067 aims to provide a complete glossary of the terms defined in that series of International Standards, providing, where appropriate, additional notes to make these definitions understandable without reference to other documents.

The following principles are used as a basis:

- no preference is implied between the different methods of recovery;
- no preference is implied between different packaging materials.

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
